Data has been collected from a sample of Councils that have recently suffered declared disasters and is being analyzed to inform engagement with DFES. The Infrastructure Policy Team has supported the establishment of a working group as proposed and requested that efforts be made to engage DFES in the establishment of the group. 1. Brendan Moon, Coordinator General, National Emergency Management Agency accepted an invitation to speak at the WALGA Transport and Roads Forum in March. An interview with Brendan and a copy of his presentation is available at Brendan Moon: How You Can Make the Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangements Work For Your Council WALGA. The purpose of this session was to illustrate the ways in which other jurisdictions, working within the same national funding arrangements (NDRRA), have provided support to Local Governments. Unfortunately, the invited senior DFES officers did not attend. 2. A survey is currently being developed to quantify the extent and impact of Disaster Recovery Funding Arrangement reimbursement delays in response to Zone resolutions. It is noted that this is only part of the suite of problems faced by Local Governments recovering from disasters. 3. DFES have agreed to participate in a working group. This has not yet been convened by WALGA. 4. The Association is exploring opportunities to further develop advocacy for changes in the implementation of recovery funding arrangements at the Local Government convention. Notes the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries' commitment to providing ongoing support and resourcing assistance to Local Governments to assist with implementation of the draft Child Safe Awareness Policy Template and other relevant actions relating to child safeguarding, through the Child Safeguarding Implementation Unit.

7.3 Abandoned Shopping Trolleys Advocacy Position

That State Council endorse the following position on Abandoned Shopping Trolleys:

The Local Government Sector advocates for State Government to consult with the Sector and prioritise legislative reforms that require retailers to contain shopping trolleys within shopping centre property boundaries, inclusive of enforcement and modified penalty mechanisms that are a realistic economic imperative for retailers to comply with containment requirements.

7.4 Speed Management Reform Advocacy Position

That the Speed Management Advocacy Position as follows, be endorsed:

- 1. That WALGA supports Local Governments wishing to manage travel speeds, including speed limit changes, as a means of achieving the many health, social and environmental benefits for communities.
- 2. That Main Roads WA (MRWA) retain the overarching authority for speed limit setting/zoning.
- That Main Roads WA speed zoning policies and processes be reformed so that Local Governments are more influential in the determination of speed limit decreases or increases for local roads.
 - a. This will include applications that are deemed to be approved when the application:
 - i. is based on assessments by competent Local Government practitioners,
 - ii. contains evidence-based identification of the benefits,
 - iii. contains preliminary designs for infrastructure safety upgrades associated with applications to increase speed limits, and
 - iv. includes an engagement strategy for managing community and stakeholder expectations.
 - b. Allows for Main Roads WA to decline an application, within a mutually agreed timeframe, on the basis that it:
 - i. does not meet the above criteria, and
 - ii. provides specific evidence for declining the application.
- 4. The WALGA seeks to work with Main Roads WA and other stakeholders, to develop a speed management guide for Local Governments.
