



# PRIMARY PREVENTION INITATIVES FOR LOCAL GOVERNMENT



Educate their staff on the factors underlying FDV and the issues residents who have or are experiencing FDV may have.



Review their policies to ensure that they support gender equality both for their own staff and for residents in their Local Government Area



Focus youth activities on developing respectful relationships and gender equality.



Support Local and State Events to increase awareness for staff and community members e.g. Conferences, Forums, Silent Marches





#### WHY DO PERPETRATOR INTERVENTION



On average for man who perpetrates family and domestic violence .....

He will have an ongoing influence on three current or former partners and potential numerous future families

On average each family will have an average of two to three children

The vast majority of perpetrators still see their children. One study found 70% see their children frequently

#### **MULTIPLE IMPACTS ON CHILDREN**

#### Perpetrator's Patterns

- coercive control towards the adult victim-survivor
- actions taken to harm the children

#### Children's Trauma & Safety

- physical abuse
- Seeing, hearing or learning about the violence

#### Effects on Family Ecology

- Loss of income
- Loss of contact with extended family
- Housing instability
- Educational and social disruptions


#### Harm to Child

- Behaviour, Social, Emotional Educational
- Developmental
- Physical Injury

# Effects on Partner's Parenting

- Depression, PTSD, anxiety, alcohol and substance use
- Loss of parenting authority
- Energy directed towards perpetrator to stay safe instead of the children
- Interference with day to day routine and basic care

"Why does she keep choosing violent men?"

"If it's that bad, why doesn't she leave?"

"They are always fighting"

"He has childhood trauma; he cannot help it"

"The children are really naughty; I think they have ADHD?"

#### CHALLENGE UNHELPFUL BELIEFS



If we continue to treat the issues in silos....

Perpetrators remain invisible and lack accountability

Adult and Child Victim-Survivors are blamed

Adult Victim-Survivors are held responsible for their children

## Pivoting towards the perpetrator means...

Keeping the perpetrators patterns **visible** in all parts of your service system

The perpetrators
pattern of
behaviour and
choices, resulting
in FDV, are
identified as the
source of harm

The perpetrator is exclusively responsible for their own behaviours and choices

It applies high standards for men as parents Good childcentred FDV practice requires a description of the specific behaviours of the perpetrator and their impact on child and family functioning
