
City of Mandurah – Rough Sleeper Count March 2020

- Team Leaders







Rough Sleeper Count March 2020




Lived Experience Stories



- According to people interviewed noticeable trends from the local story collection, which occurred between November 2019 to January 2020 indicated:
 - Departmental interventions such as child removal (or anything that disrupts a family unit) has major implications on mental health and payments/child support etc. and the person's capacity to maintain housing costs
 - During a person's experience of living in a situation of homelessness, they noted negative impacts of lacking mental health assistance with no options for local low threshold crisis accommodation
 - When transitioning out of homelessness, feedback that on going, one on one casework and capacity building opportunities would be required to help people remain housed
