Danjoo Koorliny

Walking together towards 2029 and beyond

Shire of Halls Creek

Aboriginal employment and traineeship programs

The Shire has used Aboriginal employment and traineeship programs as an opportunity to improve community engagement; whilst delivering social and safety outcomes for the youth and community of Halls Creek. The Shire's activities demonstrate the true value of engagement utilising concepts of Asset Based Community Development, empowerment and inclusion principles - whilst applying a healthy dose of good old remote community get up and go.

City of Fremantle Walyalup - what's in a name

In 2019, the then Minister for Lands Ben Wyatt wrote to the City to encourage the conservation and use of local Aboriginal language in a new urban renewal project at Kings Square, in the heart of Fremantle. The City of Fremantle's Reconciliation Action plan had identified opportunities for renaming, and Walyalup was born. The next two years was a comprehensive exercise in negotiation, compromise, cultural learning and community development.

'Let's Talk About Racism' is a successful, unique and evolving program that tackles racism head on, its impacts, causes and solutions.

This program, involving Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal staff from the neighbouring cities of Cockburn and Melville, aims to increase awareness and understanding of racism, and discuss ways to step up and take action to stop its perpetuation.

Shire of Carnarvon and Lock **Hospital Working Group**

The Path of Pain - a journey of resilience, healing and reconciliation in bringing to light the real story of the Bernier and **Dorre Island Histories**

Deb Wilkes (Shire of Carnarvon)

This presentation will focus on the history of the Bernier and Dorre Island Lock Hospitals. Operating between 1908 and 1919, more than 800 Aboriginal women, men and children were removed from their homelands and forcibly placed on these remote islands.

Many never returning home. This removal of people led to the dislocation of generations of people from their families. communities and country, and interrupted the ability to care for country and undertake cultural practices and responsibilities.

These forced incarcerations caused physical, social, emotional, cultural and spiritual trauma to the individuals directly affected and their descendants.

As primarily community driven and Aboriginal-led, supported by the Shire of Carnarvon, this project will showcase an acknowledgement journey that enabled truth telling and healing for all people connected to this story. It is a testament to the premise that for reconciliation to be effective, it must involve truth telling that actively addresses issues of inequality, systemic racism and instances where the rights of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders are ignored, denied or reduced.



Undalup Association

Continuous cultural connection to country

The Wadandi People have a long association with the South West and its natural resources. Aboriginal lore (learning and knowledge of tradition) dictates how best to keep "Caring for Country" and this is something the Undalup Association is sharing with the broader South West communities.

Aboriginal heritage is a central element in Aboriginal spirituality and customary lore and is inseparable from the natural environment.

This presentation will discuss how Wadandi knowledge is being used for the sustainable management of natural resources; the land, water, marine and biological systems.

Shire of Esperance

Protecting the Dukes Dunes - a practical partnership in coastal management and cultural heritage in the Shire of **Esperance**

The Esperance coastal landscape and associated cultural heritage sites and values are extremely important to the Esperance Nyungar people. Orleans Bay Regional Park, aka 'The Duke' is one of Esperance's most prized and valued beaches for both tourists and locals alike. A collaborative project between the Shire, Esperance Tjaltjraak Native Title Aboriginal Corporation, Duke of Orleans Bay Caravan Park, Coastwest, and South Coast NRM is protecting the environmental and cultural values around the Duke, while ensuring recreational activities are sustainable for current and future generations.

The collaborative approach has had significant benefits for all stakeholders involved, and sets up the model the Shire will use going forward when working in culturally significant areas.

City of Perth and the WA **Indigenous Tourism Operators** Council (WAITOC)

Aboriginal Tourism Academy: a business mentoring opportunity for Local Governments

The City of Perth and WAITOC have been working in partnership for over four years to create what is now known as the Aboriginal Tourism Academy. Aboriginal businesses are provided with tailored assistance, which has helped to grow the number of Aboriginal Tourism Businesses in the Perth region from four to 30 in this time.

There are many positive local economic and community impacts. WAITOC welcomes interested Local Governments to join the Cities of Perth, Kalamunda, South Perth and Wanneroo in this business mentoring program for Aboriginal tourism businesses.

Gathering Noongar water knowledge for the urban **Djarlgarro Beeliar catchment**

Storylines Digital Archive: connecting communities. revitalising culture, creating opportunity

The State Library of Western Australia's Storylines Program connects with thousands of Western Australian Indigenous clients through a network of Public Libraries, Community Resource Centres (CRCs) and Aboriginal organisations across the State. Built on culturally relevant and accessible software developed for Aboriginal communities, it is a digital platform providing learning and access to heritage collections including photographs, oral histories, audio recordings, video recordings, and genealogical information.

Growing out of the State Library's long and reciprocal relationships with Indigenous communities, Storylines enables the State Library to facilitate the protection, collection, and return of Aboriginal heritage collections to individuals, families and communities. It is proving to be a driver of change, stimulating creative practice, fostering tourism enterprise, harnessing multi-generational engagement, as well as creating new skills while preserving culture, language and history. As a State wide resource Storylines creates a forum for Indigenous Western Australians to explore their diverse histories, and to tell their own story.

This presentation will share information about how the platform contributes to ensuring that Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander culture and languages are strong, supported and flourishing.
