
Close to 100 Acts that dictated Aboriginal peoples lives 1829- 'settlement of WA on 'wild and unoccupied lands'

1992- Mabo decision-This decision altered the foundation of land law in Australia and rendered terra nullius a legal fiction

Only took 163 YEARS to acknowledge that Aboriginal people had rights on their land

Educate your Organisation

Implement	Implement mandated history sessions for ALL staff at ALL levels regardless of how long they have been employed
Get	When you have learnt the history, get a working group together and unpack your policies
Ask	If your working in community, ask the children in what they need PLEASE NO CHEAP SAUSAGES!
Organise	Organise monetary payments for parents or grandparents to attend these workshops
Listen	Please listen with intentmeaning listen with the will to make a difference
Don't leave	Don't leave any stone unturned



Understand Trauma

Trauma Informed Programs

- Places where the Aboriginal people access should be culturally SAFE
- Frontline staff must build trustworthiness and transparency when engaging
- Cultural Support from Aboriginal staff
- Collaboration and Mutuality- Aboriginal people must be active participants in their community decisions
- A voice and a choice- to prevent retraumatization





Tired Old Policies


- Who is making these policies?

- If it supports closing the gap initiative, what's stopping you from changing it?



- Designate a safe place for them to come to, when they are experiencing issues at school
- Do Not make DCP your first point of call! Try all the other avenues before you do
- We need to keep our most vulnerable children safe at all times

Programs to Support Grandparents

- Engage and talk to grandparents
- Include them in the discussions when designing programs
- Offer monetary payments for their time
- Meet with on a regular basis to build relationships
